Errors and Omissions

4 December 2001: On page 471, while speaking on Motion 8: Young Farmer Program, Eva Rodgerson finishes speaking, and the Speaker calls on Phillip Brown to continue speaking to the motion. Phillip Brown gets up and recognizes some guests, and then Eva Rodgerson is incorrectly listed as continuing to speak to the motion. Phillip Brown should be continued as the speaker.

6 December 2001: On page 517, while speaking to the question “Provincial drug assistance plans,” the Leader of the Opposition is incorrectly listed as responding to his own question. It should really be Jamie Ballem.

26 March 2002: On page 974, the Leader of the Opposition rises to speak to the budgetary motion, and the title is incorrectly listed as: Address in Reply to the Speech From the Throne. It should read: Adjourned Debate on the Budgetary Motion.

27 March 2002: Page number 976 is duplicated in the Green Bound edition with different information on the pages. For this reason, the second instance of 976 will be renumbered, for indexing purposes, as 976-2.

In this instance, because of the positioning on the page, the online and bound edition keep the same pagination. The error occurs in both versions, but there are no extra pages attributed to the online version. As usual, the Green Bound pagination would supercede the online pagination if there were a discrepancy.

3 April 2002: The page numbers 1106-1107 are duplicated in the Green Bound edition with different information on the pages. For this reason, the second instance of 1106-1107 will be renumbered, for indexing purposes, as 1106-2, 1107-2.

The error is more pronounced online, because of the discrepancy in pagination between the online and bound versions. Online, page numbers 1106-1108 are duplicated, with different information on the pages. This error will not affect this index, since it is the Green Bound pagination that is being used.

5 April 2002: The Green Bound edition is missing 20 pages at the start of volume II. Pages 1222 through to and including page 1243, have been omitted from the printed version of Hansard. The pages are still available online, however, and have been photocopied and added to the Hansard copy, although the spacing is slightly off as a result of the variances between the two versions.

10 April 2002: On page 1343, the Leader of the Opposition is listed as responding to a question by Philip Brown “Meeting of the Public Accounts Committee,” but in the next paragraph there is no new speaker listed, so the reader is left to assume that it is the Leader of the Opposition who continues speaking. It is much more likely that it is a continuation of

Philip Brown's question, and that the following question "Domoic acid shuts down mussel bays" was actually posed by Philip Brown, as opposed to the Leader of the Opposition, who is incorrectly listed as speaking.

1 May 2002: On page 2046, Gail Shea makes reference to how, on Wednesday, 24 April, she was misquoted in Hansard, having said "condemnation" when speaking on a motion, and having it recorded as "condonation." Gail Shea did not use the word condemnation on Wednesday 24 April. She used the word "condemnation" during Motion 28, on Tuesday, 23 April, and in both the Green Bound edition of Hansard, page 1751, and the online version, page 1752, "condemnation" is the word that appears - there is no record of "condonation." It is possible the error was corrected. In the Clerk's Journal, the proper date, 23 April, and page number are provided.

3 May 2002: Page number 2150 is duplicated in the Green Bound edition with different information on each page. For this reason, the second instance of 2150 will be renumbered, for indexing purposes, as 2150-2.

The error is more pronounced online, because of the discrepancy in pagination between the online and bound versions. Online, page numbers 2150-2151 are duplicated, with different information on the pages. This error will not affect this index, since it is the Green Bound pagination that is being used.

10 May 2002: On page number 2412, during the vote to Adjourn Debate on the Budgetary Motion, the vote was erroneously entitled: Voting on Resolution No. 25.
